We all can emphathise with their customers (and the vanished firm's ex-employees) because those people didn't expect--or plan--to be victims of negative change. (Even I lost money paid to extend my BUSS and Sextant subscriptions....)

### DO YOU WANT TO BE POOR?!

MAKE MOOLA WITH YOUR H/Z 8-BIT MACHINE by Contributing Editor A. Stapher

It's probably unknown to many SEBHC JOURNAL subscribers, but our computers are capable of a plethora of ways to help make extra spare-time money at home. But there's been far too little information published about "How-2 Do It"! Most magazines emphasise business applications of microcomputers. While many programmers are making money in the field of small business consultation, this approach isn't practicable for we "obsolete computer" owners.

Fortunately, most ways to make money with microcomputers don't involve conventional business methods. With a little imagination your computer can not only be profitable, but great fun as well. You don't have to feel guilty about most expences because your computer has long since been paid for. And it's now time for it to start repaying you for those long hours you put into learning how to make it reliably perform some useful tricks.

#### STARTUP, IDEAS & HINTS

Your first step toward spare-time computer income is to write down a list of money-making ideas. You should always be on the lookout for such ideas. Find them by reading books and magazines, or by talking with friends. Thinking about a product, or services that you need or would like available may give you more ideas. Money-making ideas involving your existing interests or hobbies are the best kind because you'll have an edge on your competition. For example, your interest in fantasy games, card or board games can be converted into salable computer programs (written in the language you're most proficient in, of course). A teacher might be able to produce exceptional educational programs in her spare time. (Hint: Find a copy of Hayden Book Company's "Home Computers Can Make You Rich" by Joe Weisbecker. It describes dozens of spare-time money-making ideas.)

There are really only four basic ways to make money in any field. You can 1 - sell products, 2 - sell services, 3 - create new products, 4 - invest time and money in any of the first three. Various combinations of these four approaches are possible. But before getting down to specific ideas, let us consider how you might turn your idea into cash income.

#### SELLING, HOW-2 NOTES ON

Mail Order Products: These involves advertising product in various publications and filling resulting orders by mail. It's fairly easy to operate a small mail-order business from your home, especially if your product is good and fairly priced and your advertisement is well written. This last is most important!

Your first step is to read several books about the mailorder business. Find some good ones in the public library or a bookstore. You'll find it's possible to start a business of this type with a minimum cash investment.

Rather than use your residential address, go rent a postoffice (or private mail centre) box. This provides a simple way of keeping business and family mail separate, ensures a degree of privacy and helps keep track of expences.

Next, find a good product source if you don't already have one. And have enough money to cover advertising costs. This will be your biggest expence. For example a small, one-time advertisement in a nationally-circulated periodical can cost from one to several hundred dollars.

But if you have an unusual, low-cost, easy-to-mail product, not generally available in local stores, you might be able to get it mentioned in a periodical often read by potential customers (hand tools in hobby magazines, software in computer journals, etc.). Publishers often will publish a "blurb" about your product when you buy advertising space. Check several magazines for where the best results are available at lowest cost.

Your selling price MUST include advertising costs. Let's say your product is a booklet costing \$1 to print and fifty cents to mail. Assume your magazine ad costs \$250, magazine circulation is 100,000, and you estimate you'll recive about 100 orders from your ad. You'll have to charge \$4 for each booklet to just break even, and that doesn't include the cost of your own time. If you got fewer than 100 orders you would lose money, but if you got 200 orders you'd make \$250 (not counting your own time--I pay myself about \$10 an hour).

#### WRITING EFFECTIVE ADVERTISMENTS

How effectively-written your ad is can make the difference between success and failure. Ad size is important, but a small, tastefully and well-written ad often is more effective than a big, splashy, multi-colour display ad. Some years ago I was in business overseas and advertised in a certain local English-language daily paper. Their "Column-inch" rates for display ads were outrageous, and ads were often badly placed.

After considerable research I discovered that newspaper's classified ads were rather effective for their cost, about fifty cents a word, 25 words minimum. They'd generate 3 or 4 orders the first day, sometimes one on the second day, and nothing after that. I finally persuaded the paper to run the the same ad every other day. This had a flashing-sign affect on readers who would read the paper front to back--especially the classified ads section. (The ads-section manager was not English fluent and often some very hilariously funny stuff would be printed!) [TO BE CONTINUED NEXT MONTH, DEFINATELY!]

Dear Sir:

A few months ago a sister of a friend of my daughter's (10 years old) was using a desktop publishing program with me on my IBM compatable. She told me that she had a computer too, that she used it to write stories, but wished she had some games for it.

I went over to see her machine and it looked like a Commodore Pet with a 5-1/4" disc drive built in; she also had an extra unit with two additional drives. (I'd never heard of the machine but I knew of Heathkit--I once bought a stereo kit from them in the early 1960s.) She has a word processor and Microsoft BASIC. I later discovered that it runs HDOS 1.6 (Issue #50.05.00) and has 48k of RAM.

As a member of the Long Island Computer Association, I thought I'd be able to get some information—and maybe some games—from its' members if I asked the editor of the newsletter to publish a request for same. I received two calls from fellow members. One [came from a] gentleman [who] gave me some public domain games (some in BASIC) that ran under CP/M and another [from] a subscriber to your newsletter by the name of Lee Stoller. He told me about HDOS and the hard-sector discs that it—[this computer]—uses. He also sent me a copy of your newsletter.

Also, have I given a sufficient description of it to ensure that whatever games I do eventually find will in fact run on the machine? Any help or advice you can give will be greatly appreciated.


